

Refreshing Fruit Tea

Requests were made to publish the refreshing Tea Sherry McColgin served at the Get-Together. Below is Sherry's recipe



4 cups boiling water

2 family size decaffeinated tea bags

3/4 cup sugar or Splenda

4 cups cold water

1 cup pineapple juice

1 cup orange juice

Pour 4 cups boiling water over the tea bags and steep for 8 minutes;

Remove and discard tea bags.

Stir in sugar or Splenda until dissolved;

stir in 4 cups cold water and juices.

Serve over ice.

BLT Dip

1 cup mayonnaise

1 cup sour cream

1 package Oscar Mayer Bacon Bits in package

2 medium tomatoes, drained and seed removed

8-10 pieces of bacon, fried crisp and crumbled

1 package of shredded lettuce

Combine mayonnaise, sour cream and bacon bits in a medium bowl, refrigerate for 6 to 12 hours.

Spread the shredded lettuce over the bottom of serving dish.

Stir half the tomatoes in the dip and pour dip over lettuce.

Sprinkle remaining tomatoes and crisp bacon over top of dip.

West Nile Disease**



Fight The Bite

What is West Nile virus?

West Nile virus is a mosquito-borne infection that can cause serious illness. Although the chances of a person getting sick are small, you can take some simple steps to reduce your risk by reducing the chance of being bitten by mosquitoes.

What are the symptoms of West Nile virus?

Mild cases of West Nile infections might include a slight fever or headache. More severe infections are marked by a rapid onset of high fever with head and body aches, disorientation, tremors, convulsions and in the most severe cases, paralysis or death. Usually symptoms occur from 5 to 15 days after exposure. No specific treatment exists for viral infections, other than to treat the symptoms and provide supportive care.

Who is at highest risk for becoming seriously ill?

Persons who are at highest risk for serious illness are persons over the age of 50. Healthy children and adults are at very low risk for illness.

Do all mosquitoes transmit the disease?

No. Most mosquitoes do not transmit the disease. While more than 58 different species of mosquitoes exist in Mississippi, only certain species have been associated with West Nile virus.

Where do mosquitoes live and breed?

Mosquitoes lay their eggs in moist areas such as standing water. The eggs become larvae that remain in the water until the adults mature and fly off. Weeds, tall grass and shrubbery provide an outdoor home for adult mosquitoes. They can also enter houses through unscreened windows or doors or broken screens. Many mosquitoes will breed in containers that hold water, such as flowerpots or discarded tires.


When are mosquitoes most active?

Some mosquitoes are most active between dusk and dawn, when the air is calm. However, others will feed at any time of day.

What bird(s) can carry West Nile virus?

In Mississippi, most West Nile virus-positive birds have been blue jays and crows. House sparrows, cardinals (red birds) and raptors (hawks and owls) are also tested. The Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) is using dead crow and jay sightings to track West Nile virus, so it's important to report any dead birds to your local health department. Not all dead birds need to be tested for West Nile virus. Birds do not transmit West Nile virus to people, but people should wear gloves when handling any dead bird or mammal because of the possibility of other diseases.

Protect yourself. . . your home. . . & community



- Avoid mosquitoes especially between dusk and dawn.
- Use mosquito repellent with DEET according to the label.
- Wear long-sleeved, long-legged clothing.



- Reduce the source
- Eliminate standing water in your yard.
 - Remove containers that collect water.
 - Screen your windows and doors.
 - Check for old tires, cans, pet dishes, clogged gutters, ditches, and garbage areas.



- Call your local health department or the West Nile Hotline to report dead birds.
- Find Health Department Info and county health department numbers under Health Department in the BellSouth White Pages.
- Contact your local public works director about specific mosquito control problems.
